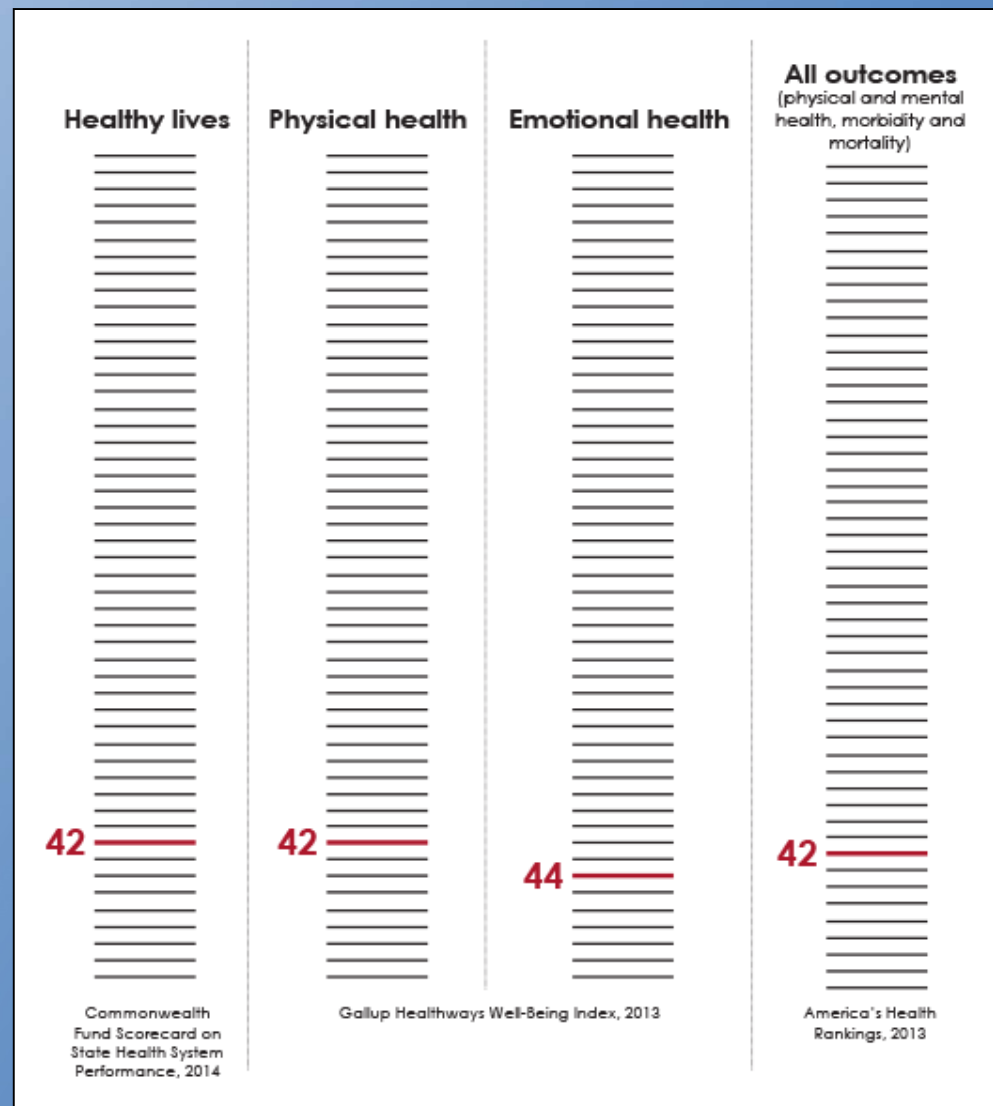
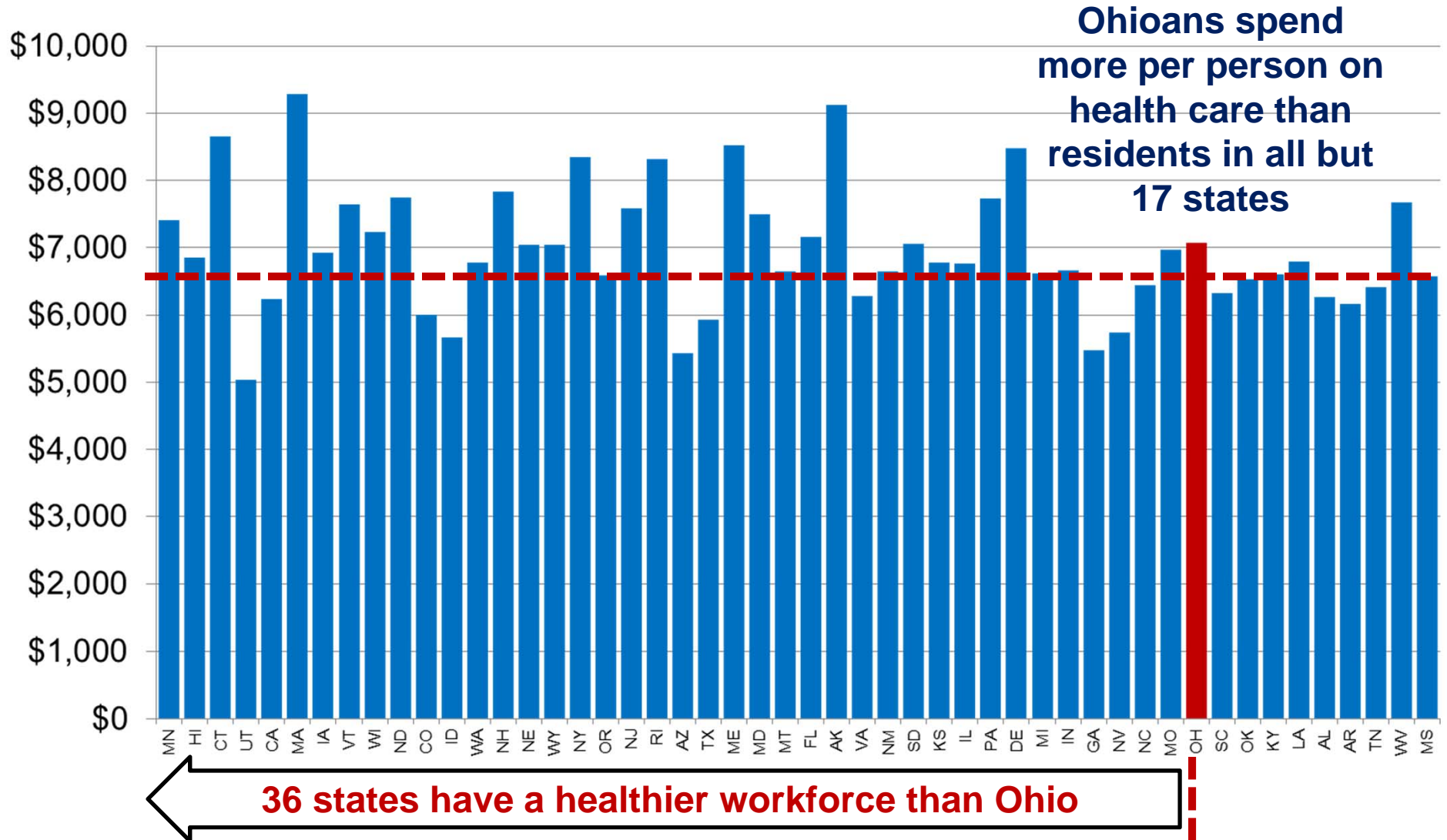

# Ohio Health Professional Shortage Areas

(as of January 1, 2014)

Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA) Category	Number of HPSAs	Total population living in HPSAs	Practitioners needed to remove HPSA designation
Primary care	124	1,063,078	130
Dental care	124	1,541,273	235
Mental health care	95	2,550,345	59
<b>Total</b>	<b>343</b>	<b>-</b>	<b>424</b>

**Note:** An HPSA designation is, in part, based on the identification that there is a shortage of health practitioners in the geographic area. For Ohio HPSAs, a “practitioner” means allopathic (MD) or osteopathic (DO) primary medical care physicians for primary medical care HPSA designations; dentists, for dental HPSA designations; and psychiatrists, for mental health care HPSA designations.<sup>19</sup>
